This definitive record sets out the essential features and characteristics of the Higher National Certificate in Public Services course. The information provided is accurate for students entering level 4 in the 2022-23 academic year<sup>5</sup>.

### Course Summary

The HNC in Public Services is for those seeking to pursue and advance a career in the public services through applied learning, bringing together the knowledge, skills and understanding that underpin the discipline. The pathway ensures a broad range of study via a core of learning while allowing for development of the civil protection specialism, which will prepare the student for further study, training or employment within a programme designed in collaboration with a range of sector specialist organisations.

### Course Aims

- Demonstrate a sound knowledge of the basic concepts of public services
- Communicate accurately and appropriately in a range of formats
- Develop the skills necessary for employment, requiring some degree of personal responsibility
- Develop transferable skills including effective team working, implementation of personal initiatives, demonstrating organisational competence and problem-solving strategies

### Course Learning Outcomes

### Awards

On successful completion of the course, students will be awarded a Higher National Certificate in Public Services.

### Course Delivery

The course is delivered at Lowestoft campus as part of the University of Suffolk at East Coast College. Students studying full-time on Higher National Certificate in Public Services are likely to have approximately 12 contact hours per week. The year is divided into two 15 week semesters, of which 12 are teaching weeks, with 3 per semester devoted to assessment activities and preparation for Assessment Boards. The contact hours will be a mix of class sessions (lecture, seminar), practical activities, developmental workshop sessions and tutorials. Students will normally be expected to undertake a minimum of a further 20 hours of independent study in an average week, but should be prepared for this to vary based on assignment deadlines and class exercises.

### Course Assessment

A variety of assessments will be used on the course to enable students to experience and adapt to different assessment styles. The assessment methods used will be appropriate to assess each module's intended learning outcomes. Assessment on the course overall will be approximately 80% coursework (including essays, reports, presentations, group work and research projects), and 20% practical assessments.

### Course Team

The academic staff delivering this course are drawn from a team that includes teaching specialists and current practitioners. All staff are qualified in their subjects with their own specialist knowledge to contribute.

### Course Costs

Students undertaking Higher National Certificate in Public Services will be charged tuition fees as detailed below.
