Course Summary

Criminology at University of Suffolk draws on Sociology, Psychology, Law, Social Policy and Philosophy in order to expose you to a range of classical and contemporary theoretical and empirical debates concerning crime and responses to criminal behaviour. You are actively encouraged to develop good analytical and reasoning skills as you engage with academic literature and evaluate research and evidence.

As a criminology student at University of Suffolk, you will be able to critically engage with national and international dimensions of crime and criminal justice policy and develop well informed views on contested public issues. There is a strong emphasis on challenging "common-sense" notions of criminal and deviant behaviours by critically examining academic research and making informed decisions based on available evidence. To this end, you will be introduced to a variety of research methods and ethical considerations, so that you can challenge and understand the limitations and ambiguities of empirical research, whilst assessing its value. This will provide an excellent theoretical and practical platform for the completion of a third-year independent project in an area of personal or career interest.

Course Aims

1. Develop students' knowledge, critical understanding and skills in Criminology.
2. Cultivate a questioning and critical approach to the understanding of human behaviour and society.
3. Encourage cognitive development and autonomous learning.
4. Develop subject specific, cognitive and key transferable skills of value in employment, further study and personal development.
5. Provide opportunities that facilitate widening participation by local/non-standard entrants to study criminology.

Optional modules available in any year will be communicated to you prior to your enrolment to facilitate module choice. Some optional modules may not run in every year of study, and the availability of optional modules depends on the level of student demand, the availability of specialist staff and timetabling constraints. In addition, we regularly review our curriculum to ensure it is up-to-date, relevant, draws on the latest research and addresses contemporary issues. As a result, the modules we offer may change over the course of your degree.

Optional recovery modules are only available in exceptional circumstances where a student must retrieve credits to ensure progression or where a standard optional module cannot be delivered.

Awards

On successful completion of the course, students will be awarded either a BSc (Hons) Criminology (with Professional Placement), BSc (Hons) Criminology (with Professional Placement and Study Abroad) or BSc (Hons) Criminology (with Study Abroad) depending on the sandwich route taken. Students who leave the course early may be eligible for a BSc Criminology (with Profession Placement), BSc Criminology (with Profession Placement and Study Abroad), BSc Criminology (with Study Abroad) on successful completion of 300 credits, at Level 4 or above with at least 180 credits at Level 5 or above and at least 60 credits at Level 6 and successfully completion of the 120 credit placement year.) A DipHE Criminology (with Professional placement), DipHE Criminology (with Professional Placement and Study Abroad), DipHE Criminology (with Study Abroad) on successful completion of 240 credits including all mandatory modules at levels 4 and 5 and successful completion of the 120 credit placement year. A DipHE Criminology on successful completion of 240 credits, including all mandatory modules at levels 4 and 5. A CertHE Criminology on successful completion of 120 credits including all mandatory modules at level 4.

Course Delivery

The course is delivered at Ipswich. Students studying full-time on BSc (Hons) Criminology are likely to have approximately 12 contact hours for level 4, 9 contact hours for level 5 and 9 contact hours for level 6. The contact hours will be a mix of lectures, seminars, practical activities, tutorials, workshops and guided learning activities through the online learning environment. Students will normally be expected to undertake 32 hours of independent study in an average week but should be prepared for this to vary based on assignment deadlines and class exercises.

Course Assessment

A variety of assessments will be used on the course to enable students to experience and adapt to different assessment styles. The assessment methods used will be appropriate to assess each module's intended learning outcomes.

Course Team

The academic staff delivering this course are drawn from a team that includes teaching specialists and current practitioners. All staff are qualified in their subjects with their own specialist knowledge to contribute.

Course Costs

Students undertaking BSc (Hons) Criminology will be charged tuition fees as detailed below.
