Entry Requirements ⁴	Applicants must hold current registration and good standing with their correspondent UK professional regulators, appropriate to their profession, either the NMC or the HCPC. All applicants are required to hold a current enhanced Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) clearance. Evidence of DBS status must be provided prior to enrolment. Applicants must demonstrate relevant post-registration clinical experience. NMC registrants must have completed a minimum of one-year post-registration practice prior to programme commencement (nurses must be first level nurses). HCPC registrants must demonstrate an appropriate level of post-registration professional experience consistent with the responsibilities of a prescribing role. Clinical experience must be relevant to the applicant's intended prescribing practice and clearly articulated within the personal statement. Applicants must demonstrate academic capability appropriate for study at Level 7 (master's level). This usually includes an undergraduate degree or equivalent professional qualification, and evidence of recent academic study or professional learning, typically within the last three years, at Level 6 or above. Applicants must submit a personal statement outlining a clearly defined scope of practice or intended area of prescribing,

Applicants must demonstrate sufficient competence and prior learning in clinical assessment, diagnostics, clinical decision-making and care planning Applicants must have an identified Designated Prescribing Practitioner (DPP) in place at the point of application. Applicants are required to provide: • The name and professional details of the DPP • Confirmation that the DPP meets PSRB requirements • Confirmation that the DPP can support prescribing practice within the applicant's defined scope of practice Applicants must provide written confirmation from their employer or line manager confirming support for the applicant to undertake the prescribing programme, including the provision of protected learning time to enable completion of academic and practice-based components of the programme. Applicants must undertake practice learning within a suitable clinical environment that supports safe and effective prescribing. The practice setting must be subject to appropriate regulatory inspection (such as the Care Quality Commission (CQC)) and provide evidence of inspection or audit where required. Applicants must not be subject to an ongoing Fitness to Practise investigation or sanction, and must declare any prior proven allegations. This definitive record sets out the essential features and characteristics of the Non-medical Prescribing V300 course. The information provided is accurate for students entering the course in the 2027/28 academic year⁵.

Course Summary

This course enables eligible healthcare professionals to acquire the knowledge, skills and competencies required to practise safely and effectively as independent and/or supplementary prescribers. The programme is aligned to current PSRB standards and the Royal Pharmaceutical Society Competency Framework for Prescribers (2021).

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In accordance with NMC and HCPC standards for non-medical prescribing programmes, students are required to complete a minimum of 78 hours of supervised practice-based learning, equivalent to approximately 12 days, across the duration of the programme. This practice learning is undertaken within an approved practice environment and is supervised by a Designated Prescribing Practitioner (DPP) who is a suitably qualified, registered, and actively practising prescriber.

The role of the DPP is central to supporting students in meeting practice-based prescribing competencies, providing supervision, feedback, and assessment opportunities that enable the development of safe, effective, and professional prescribing practice. The programme team works in partnership with DPPs to ensure that practice learning experiences are structured, appropriate to the student's scope of practice, and aligned with regulatory expectations.

The curriculum is explicitly informed by NMC and HCPC educational standards for prescribing, which emphasise competence in prescribing principles rather than specialty-specific content. Consistent with these standards, the programme prioritises the application of legislative, ethical, professional, and pharmacological principles to the student's own area of clinical practice. Students are therefore expected to demonstrate professional autonomy and accountability in contextualising learning to their current or intended prescribing role.

The first phase of the programme focuses on establishing the foundational competencies required by NMC and HCPC, including professional accountability, legal and ethical frameworks, consultation and clinical reasoning, evidence-based prescribing decisions, prescribing governance, and core pharmacological principles. The latter phase supports the application of prescribing competencies across commonly encountered clinical contexts, including cardiovascular care, mental health, pain management, reproductive health, and prescribing for special populations such as children and older adults, ensuring graduates are prepared for safe prescribing across diverse settings.

Learning and teaching strategies are designed to meet NMC and HCPC expectations for student-centred, practice-integrated education, and include virtual lectures, enquiry-based learning, group discussion, experiential learning, and case-based approaches. The achievement of prescribing competence is assessed through both academic and practice-based components, with successful completion of supervised practice and demonstration of competence being fundamental to eligibility for this recordable qualification.

Course Aims

1. Prepare healthcare professionals to meet the required regulatory standards to act as Independent and/ or Supplementary prescribers.
2. Extend opportunities for critical appraisal of their existing practice whilst achieving the RPS prescribing competencies in practice.
3. Enable students to engage in comprehensive enquiry with specific identified aspects of their prescribing practice.

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Course Learning Outcomes

The following statements define what students graduating from the Pharmacist Independent Prescribing V300P course will have been judged to have demonstrated in order to achieve the award. These statements, known as learning outcomes, have been formally approved as aligned with the generic qualification descriptor for level 7 awards as set out by the UK Quality Assurance Agency (QAA)⁶.

1. Demonstrate advanced diagnostic reasoning by critically synthesising information from holistic history-taking, clinical assessment and investigations to generate, justify and prioritise evidence-based differential and definitive diagnoses that reflect the individual patient's physical and psychosocial needs.
2. Use critical appraisal of the evidence base to inform the identification, evaluation and justification of pharmacological and non-pharmacological treatment options, tailored to individual patient characteristics and aligned with relevant clinical guidelines.
3. Apply advanced, ethically informed communication skills to enable shared decision-making, adapting discussions of treatment options, risks and benefits to individual patient needs, respecting patient preferences, and ensuring valid informed consent.
4. Apply a systematic understanding of prescribing systems and governance to prescribe and deprescribe safely and effectively within formulary and care pathway frameworks, taking account of polypharmacy, adverse drug reactions and patient safety, and maintaining accurate, complete and legally compliant prescribing records.
5. Critically apply principles of patient-centred communication to tailor and deliver clear, accessible information and management plans about conditions and prescribed medicines, supporting informed medicine use, adherence, self-care and appropriate safety-netting.
6. Apply a systematic approach to construct and implement monitoring and follow-up plans that evaluate therapeutic effectiveness and safety, identify and respond to adverse outcomes, and modify management appropriately over time, including escalation or referral where indicated, in partnership with the patient.
7. Practise within professional scope with critical awareness of limitations of competence, and respond appropriately to prescribing errors, near misses and adverse events through the use of relevant local and national governance and reporting systems.
8. Demonstrate accountable prescribing through systematic understanding and application of relevant legal, ethical, professional, and governance frameworks.
9. Critically evaluate personal prescribing competence through reflective practice and self-assessment, and apply quality-improvement principles, using relevant data, feedback, and the Continuing Professional Development cycle to identify opportunities to enhance professional practice.
10. Demonstrate critical understanding of multidisciplinary team roles in prescribing, collaborating effectively to integrate relevant professional input into management plans, and identifying referrals or consultations with other healthcare professionals as appropriate to support coordinated, holistic patient care.

Awards

On successful completion of the course, students will be awarded the Non-medical Independent and/or Supplementary Prescribing.

Course Delivery

The course is delivered at University of Suffolk, Ipswich campus. Non-medical Prescribing is delivered part-time with students likely to have approximately 20 in-person taught days and 6 asynchronous days. The contact hours will be a mix of lectures, seminars and practical activity. In addition, students will be required to participate in 78 hours of work-based supervision. Students should be prepared to undertake approximately up to half a day of independent study in an average week but should be prepared for this to vary based on assignment deadlines and class exercises.

Course Assessment

A variety of assessments are used on the course as required by the professional regulators. The assessment methods used are appropriate to assess the intended learning outcomes to ensure safe prescribing practice at the point of qualification. The team support students to experience and adapt to different assessment styles. Assessment on the course overall will be majority coursework (including poster, practice assessment documents, case studies) as well as examinations and practical assessments.

Special Features

On successful completion of the Non-Medical Prescribing V300 course students are eligible to apply for a prescribing annotation on the register for HCPC or NMC as appropriate to the registrant.
