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Course Summary

The MSc Psychology programme offers students a conversion route into psychology. The course covers a range of psychological perspectives including biological, cognitive, developmental, and social. The course is underpinned by a thorough review of a range of research methods, both qualitative and quantitative, and exploration of the scientific method. Delivery of teaching will include face-to-face lectures, online activities, discussion and seminar groups as well as practical workshop sessions in dedicated laboratories. Students will also undertake their own independent research project under supervision. Graduates from the programme who achieve a minimum of 50% overall will be eligible for the Graduate Basis for Chartered Membership (GBC) of the British Psychological Society (BPS).

Course Aims

1. Advance scientific understanding of the mind, brain, behaviour, and experience, and their dynamic interaction with individual, social, and environmental contexts.
2. Equip students with advanced research skills, encompassing both quantitative and qualitative methodologies, ethical considerations, and analytical techniques, enabling them to design and conduct independent psychological research to a high standard.
3. Foster a critical appreciation of the relationship between theory and evidence, enabling students to evaluate how theoretical frameworks shape research design and how empirical findings inform and refine psychological theory.
4. Encourage critical engagement with diverse psychological perspectives, supporting students in synthesising and evaluating competing approaches to complex psychological questions.
5. Promote awareness of the ethical, cultural, and societal dimensions of psychological science, enhancing students' ability to apply psychological knowledge responsibly and reflectively.
6. Support the development of advanced transferable skills, including scientific communication, critical analysis, data interpretation, and problem-solving, to prepare students for professional or academic progression.
7. Apply psychological theory and research to real-world challenges, enabling students to translate academic knowledge into practical solutions across a range of settings.

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Awards

On successful completion of the course, students will be awarded a MSc Psychology. Students who leave the course early may be eligible for a PgD Psychology on successful completion of 120 credits or a PgC Psychology on successful completion of 60 credits.

Course Delivery

The course is delivered at our Ipswich campus. Students on the MSc Psychology course are likely to have between 7-13 contact hours per week, dependent on the block and module(s). There is also an additional 12 contact hours for supervision tutorials associated with the Advanced Psychology Project across an academic year. The contact hours will be a mix of face-to-face lectures, online activities, seminars and practical workshops. Students will normally be expected to undertake 1550 hours of independent study across the academic year but should be prepared for this to vary based on assessment deadlines and class exercises.

Course Assessment

A variety of assessments will be used on the course to enable students to experience and adapt to different assessment styles. The assessment methods used will be appropriate to assess each module's intended learning outcomes. Assessment on the course overall will be mostly from coursework, including evaluations, reports, presentations, group work, reflective learning journals and research projects.

Special Features

Graduates who have passed all modules to a total of 180 credits, including the Advanced Psychology Project, and have gained a minimum of 50% overall are eligible to apply for the Graduate Basis for Chartered Membership (GBC) of the British Psychological Society (BPS).

Course Team

The academic staff delivering this course are drawn from a team that includes teaching specialists and current practitioners. All staff are qualified in their subjects with their own specialist knowledge to contribute and most are registered with the appropriate professional body (i.e. BPS).

Course Costs

Students undertaking MSc Psychology will be charged tuition fees as detailed below:
