Course Summary

The Visual Art degree is a broad-based Visual Art course that aims to equip students with the technical, reflective, and entrepreneurial skills to develop their creative voice and progress into economically sustainable creative careers. With its interdisciplinary content, this programme could open career opportunities as practising artists, community artists, illustrators, exhibition/event's organisers, arts administrators, lecturers, art consultants, gallery managers, researchers, curators, designers, and teachers. Importantly, it aims to develop graduates who are creative problem solvers and who can positively contribute to the cultural regeneration of the local area.

Course Aims

In providing this course, the University and the course team aim to:

- Support students in the conception, production, promotion, and dissemination of their artwork
- 2. Develop technical and creative skills in order to explore and express ideas through the creation of art.
- 3. Prepare students for professional life in the creative field by offering a programme of study that recognises the overlapping and changing nature of many art disciplines.
- 4. Develop understanding of different audiences in the creation and dissemination of art work.
- 5. Develop opportunities for students to exhibit, engage and respond to audiences.
- 6. Introduce students to contextual and ethical issues surrounding the creation of contemporay art.
- 7. Develop students critical and anlaytical skills through written assignments and presentations.
- 8. Develop professional skills including collaboration, self-promotion, entrepreneurship, community building.

Awards

On successful completion of the course, students will be awarded a BA (Hons) Visual Art. Students who leave the course early may be eligible for a DipHE Visual Art on successful completion of 240 credits including all mandatory modules at levels 4 and 5, or a CertHE Visual Art on successful completion of 120 credits including all mandatory modules at level 4.

Course Delivery

The course is delivered at East Coast College (Lowestoft). Students studying full-time on BA(Hons) Visual Art are likely to have approximately 10-11 contact hours for level 4, 9 contact hours for level 5 and 6-9 contact hours for level 6. The contact hours will be a mix of lecture, seminar, practical activity. Students will normally be expected to undertake 30-35 hours of independent study in an average week but should be prepared for this to vary based on assignment deadlines and class exercises.

Course Assessment

A variety of assessments will be used on the course to enable students to experience and adapt to different assessment styles. The assessment methods used will be appropriate to assess each module's intended learning outcomes. Assessment on the course overall will be 100% coursework (including portfolios, exhibitions, essays, reports, presentations, group work, reflective reports and research projects)

Course Team

The academic staff delivering this course are drawn from a team that includes teaching specialists and current practitioners. All staff are qualified in their subjects with their own specialist knowledge to contribute.

Course Costs

Students undertaking BA (Hons) Visual Art will be charged tuition fees as detailed below.

Students will be required to pay additional costs for optional trips, including day trips and international residential stays at Level 4, 5, and 6. The approximate total cost of these trips will be £350 per year. Students are likely to incur other costs for equipment and material such as sketchbooks, paint, canvas etc. amounting to approximately £150 per year.

Any students undertaking voluntary work will need to provide an enhanced DBS certificate and the associated costs. Students will be required to pay for their DBS check and a small ID check and processing fee; additional fees may be incurred upon a student returning from a period of intercalation.
