### Course Summary

This module is for qualified Health Visitors or School Nurses who completed their training without undertaking the V100 prescribing qualification, but are now required, by their employers, to successfully complete this module in order to become a community practitioner nurse prescriber.

### Course Aims

This module aims to prepare specialist community public health nurses to prescribe safely, appropriately and cost effectively from the community practitioner formulary for nurse prescribers.

### Course Learning Outcomes

The following statements define what students graduating from the Community Practitioner Nurse Prescriber V100 course will have been judged to have demonstrated in order to achieve the award. 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On completion of this module the student will be able to:

1. Assess and consult with patient/clients, clients, parents and carers
2. Undertake a thorough history, including medication history and current medication (including over-the-counter, alternative and complementary health therapies) to inform diagnosis
3. Understand and apply the relevant legislation to the practice of nurse/midwife prescribing
4. Critically appraise, use sources of information/advice and decision support systems in prescribing practice
5. Understand the influences that can affect prescribing practice, and demonstrate your understanding by managing your prescribing practice in an ethical way
6. Understand and apply knowledge of drug actions in prescribing practice
7. Demonstrate an understanding of the roles and relationships of others involved in prescribing, supplying and administering medicines
8. Prescribe safely, appropriately and cost effectively
9. Practise within a framework of professional accountability and responsibility

### Course Design

The design of this course has been guided by the Nursing and Midwifery Council (NMC) (2006) Standards of proficiency for Nurse and Midwife prescribers.

### Course Structure

The Community Practitioner Nurse Prescriber V100 comprises one module at level 6.

### Awards

On successful completion of the course, students will be eligible to have the Community Practitioner Nurse Prescriber V100 qualification recorded at the NMC.

### Course Delivery

The course is delivered at the Ipswich campus. The 19.5 contact hours will be a mix of lectures and workshops. Taught sessions will be supplemented by online resources. Students will also be required to participate in application of theory to practice in their area of work supported by a mentor.

### Course Assessment

The assessment methods include a written examination and the completion of a case study.

### Course Team

The academic staff delivering this course are drawn from a team that includes teaching specialists and current practitioners. All staff are qualified in their subjects with their own
