This definitive record sets out the essential features and characteristics of the BA (Hons) English Literature with Language course. The information provided is accurate for students entering level 4 in the 2019-20 academic year<sup>5</sup>.

**Course Summary**

The BA (Hons) English Literature with Language programme offers an innovative approach to the study of literature and language. Students explore a broad range of texts, from classical plays to contemporary films and dystopian novels, while conducting research in sociolinguistics, literary linguistics, and psycholinguistics, including language acquisition and disorders. They undertake student-led research at nationally and internationally significant archives, such as The Hold, and develop employability skills that are essential for careers involving strategic planning, and research design and implementation. The course is delivered by highly qualified lecturers and practitioners. As well as academic and creative skills, students gain valuable work experience and professional recognition through established course partnerships with local schools, arts organisations, publishers, and regional theatres, and have the opportunity to enter exclusive writing competitions. Students develop core creative capacities that are essential to succeed in a diverse and rapidly changing global environment.

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### Course Aims

The following aims describe what we aim to provide on the course and what a graduate of the BA (Hons) English Literature with Language at the University of Suffolk should know and be able to do.

The aims of the BA (Hons) English Literature with Language are to:

- inspire enthusiasm for English and an appreciation of its past and continuing social, cultural, political and economic importance
- provide an intellectually stimulating experience of learning and studying
- help students to recognise and utilise the expressive resources of language
- encourage students to reflect critically upon the acts of reading and writing and on the history of textual production and reception
- foster wide and varied reading through a broad and diverse curriculum
- provide opportunities for interdisciplinary and contextual approaches
- provide a study of the theoretical frameworks of linguistics
- develop descriptive and analytical techniques in relation to the development, use and variation of language
- foster openness of mind, conceptual sophistication in argument and the ability to engage critically with a range of cultural forms and values
- provide a basis for further study in English or related subjects and for the teaching of English at all levels
- develop a range of subject-specific and generic skills of value in graduate employment, including high-order critical, analytic and research skills, and advanced competence in oral and written communication.

### Course Learning Outcomes

The following statements define what students graduating from the BA (Hons) English Literature with Language course will have been judged to have demonstrated in order to achieve the award. ### Awards

On successful completion of the course, students will be awarded a BA (Hons) English Literature with Language. Students who leave the course early may be eligible for a DipHE English Literature with Language on successful completion of 240 credits including all mandatory modules at level 5, or a CertHE English Literature with Language on successful completion of 120 credits, including the level 4 module Introduction to Linguistics.

### Course Delivery

The course is delivered at Ipswich. Students studying full-time on BA (Hons) English Literature with Language are likely to have between 10 and 12 contact hours per week (plus tutorial appointments). The contact hours will be a mix of seminar, workshop, group work, practical activity, and online tasks. Students who have chosen to take a professional practice module at level 6 will also be required to participate in 10 days of full-time work (or equivalent) in a work placement. Students will be expected to undertake more independent study as they progress through their degree.

### Course Assessment

A variety of assessments will be used on the course to enable students to experience and adapt to different assessment styles. The assessment methods used will be appropriate to assess each module's intended learning outcomes. Assessment on the course overall will be approximately 95% coursework (including critical essays, presentations, annotated bibliographies, data analysis, case study reports, research papers and dissertations) with one examination at Level 4.

### Course Team

The academic staff delivering this course are drawn from a team that includes teaching specialists and current practitioners. All staff are qualified in their subjects with their own specialist knowledge to contribute.

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### Course Costs

Students undertaking BA (Hons) English Literature with Language will be charged tuition fees as detailed below.

Payment of tuition fees is due at the time of enrolment and is managed in accordance with the Tuition Fee Policy.

It is recommended that certain essential texts are purchased however some books may be bought second hand so that no module should cost more than £25.

For a work placement module at level 6 you would need to meet the cost of getting to your place of work.
