This definitive record sets out the essential features and characteristics of the MSc Public Health Nursing course. The information provided is accurate for students entering level 7 in the 2018-19 academic year.<sup>5</sup>

### Course Summary

This 60 credit Masters dissertation module is for Registered Nurses and Midwives who hold a Post Graduate qualification in Specialist Community Public Health Nursing in the pathways of either school nursing or health visiting. The course is offered in part-time mode over two semesters. Each student will be allocated one academic supervisor. The supervisor will have an appreciation of the chosen area of study and will have a broad understanding of the health and social issues as appropriate to the research topic.

### Course Aims

- To enable the students to demonstrate mastery of a subject relevant to their own practice through the process of research
- To facilitate the students to execute the stages of the research process
- To enable students to critically evaluate the impact of research on their own professional practice, policy and further research

### Course Learning Outcomes

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### Course Delivery

The course is delivered at Ipswich. Students studying on MSc Public Health Nursing are likely to have approximately 20 hours of individual research tutorials. Students will normally be expected to undertake approximately 580 hours of independent study.

### Course Assessment

Assessment on the course overall will be 100% coursework by means of a 12,000 word dissertation.

### Course Team

The academic staff delivering this course are drawn from a team that includes teaching specialists and current practitioners. All staff are qualified in their subjects with their own specialist knowledge to contribute.

Students undertaking MSc Public Health Nursing will be charged tuition fees as detailed below.
