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### **Course Summary**

Politics at Suffolk seeks to enable students to take an informed, independent perspective on the nature, forms, causes and consequences of politics. This will consider political theory, British politics and international comparative politics and throughout the course, you will maintain a critical focus on how political ideas and policies translate into 'real, felt' political action and outcomes 'on the ground'. This includes, for example, relating theory to contemporary social justice and social policy issues. It also includes students' active engagement in the subject and the course is built around a backbone of students' involvement in project work, applied social science research and opportunities for political engagement and professional development. By the end of the course, as well as having gained a good, broad knowledge of political science, students will be ready to enter employment or further study with skills in political analysis, critical awareness of the organisational context of change and influence, and interpersonal skills in advocacy and persuasion. Politics graduates have an important range of analytical, data and organisational skills applicable to a full range of graduate opportunities.

### **Course Aims**

- To investigate the nature, forms, causes and consequences of politics
- To study power and engage deeply with political theory and philosophy
- To analyse local, national, regional and supranational power structures and their consequences for people
- To allow for an engagement with (broadly defined) political organisations through the use on group work and project work
- To develop subject specific, cognitive and employability skills for personal development, postgraduate study and a range of graduate careers
- To promote increasing participation in education for the local community by supporting a range of learners, including non-traditional entrants, at degree level

### **Course Learning Outcomes**

2. Critically examine the social, economic, historical, and cultural contexts of political behaviour and the development, structure and operation of different political systems.
3. Identify the contested nature of political ideas and concepts and their normative and empirical foundations.
4. Outline how politics manifests itself across and between a range of political actors, political systems and forms of organisation at local, national and international levels.

5. Critically evaluate, interpret and synthesise political arguments, theories and evidence.
6. Identify, investigate, analyse and advocate solutions to political problems.
7. Develop a politically informed ethical and value framework and awareness about the major practical, political and moral challenges facing contemporary global society.

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specialist staff and timetabling constraints. In addition, we regularly review our curriculum to ensure it is up-to-date, relevant, draws on the latest research and addresses contemporary issues. As a result, the modules we offer may change over the course of your degree.

### **Awards**

On successful completion of the course, students will be awarded a BA (Hons) Politics. Students who leave the course early may be eligible for a BA Politics on successful completion of 300 credits at Level 4 or above (including at least 180 credits at Level 5 or above and at least 60 credits at Level 6); a DipHE Politics on successful completion of 240 credits including all mandatory modules at levels 4 and 5; a CertHE Politics on successful completion of 120 credits including all mandatory modules at levels 4.

### **Course Delivery**

The course is delivered at University of Suffolk. Students studying full-time on BA (Hons) Politics are likely to have approximately 288 tutor-structured learning hours (which includes contact time) for level 4, 216 tutor-structured learning hours for level 5, and 216 tutor-structured learning hours for level 6. Tutor-structured learning hours will be a mix of lectures, seminars, workshops, tutorial sessions, and guided learning activities through our online learning environment. There is an optional work placement and work shadowing opportunity equivalent to 10 days in the final year of study. Students will normally be expected to undertake 28 hours of independent study in an average week at level 4, (672 hours per year), 31 hours of independent study at level 5, (744 hours per year) and 32 hours of independent study at level 6, (768 hours per year), but should be prepared for this to vary based on assignment deadlines and class exercises.

### **Course Assessment**

A variety of assessments will be used on the course to enable students to experience and adapt to different assessment styles. The assessment methods used will be appropriate to assess each module's intended learning outcomes. Assessment on the course overall will be coursework (including essays, reports, presentations, group work, reflective learning journals and research projects).

### **Course Team**

The academic staff delivering this course are drawn from a specialist politics and social science teaching team.

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**Course Costs**

Students undertaking BA (Hons) Politics will be charged tuition fees as detailed below.
