This definitive record sets out the essential features and characteristics of the BA (Hons) Politics and Sociology course. The information provided is accurate for students entering level 4 in the 2022-23 academic year⁵.

Course Summary

Politics is about power, ideas and values. Sociology is about the major contours of the modern world. It is these contours of state, work, money and how people live that shapes the environment in which politics takes place. Sociology studies the patterns within the social environment in which politics operates. The study of politics and the study of sociology are

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often deeply intertwined but sometimes use different perspectives, methods and questions. The Politics and Sociology course at Suffolk will give students the knowledge and space to engage deeply with political and social theory and philosophy and to assess the world around them. In addition to acquiring an understanding of British and international political structures and social trends, our course offers a distinct focus on political and social action across party politics and campaign and community politics. The course is also active in its delivery with an emphasis on group work, project work, employability and engagement with political organisations (broadly defined).

Course Aims

- To investigate the nature, forms, causes and consequences of politics.
- To study power and engage deeply with political and social theory and philosophy.
- To analyse local, national, regional and supranational power structures and their consequences for people.
- To allow for an engagement with (broadly defined) political organisations through the use of group work and project work.
- To develop subject specific, cognitive and employability skills for personal development, postgraduate study and a range of graduate careers.
- To investigate the changing nature of social life with its consequences for patterns of diversity, inequality, and injustice.
- To study and develop a critical account of the key features and debates in social theory that aim to explain social life.

Course Learning Outcomes

The following statements define what students graduating from the BA (Hons) Politics and Sociology course will have been judged to have demonstrated in order to achieve the award. These statements, known as learning outcomes, have been formally approved as aligned with the generic qualification descriptor for level 6 awards as set out by the UK Quality Assurance Agency (QAA)⁶.

6. Outline how politics manifests itself across and between a range of political actors, political systems and forms of organisation at local, national and international levels.

7. Critically evaluate, interpret and synthesise political and sociological arguments, theories and evidence.
8. Identify, investigate, analyse and advocate solutions to political and social problems.
9. Develop a politically informed ethical and value framework and awareness about the major practical, political and moral challenges facing contemporary global society.

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ensure it is up-to-date, relevant, draws on the latest research and addresses contemporary issues. As a result, the modules we offer may change over the course of your degree.

Awards

On successful completion of the course, students will be awarded a BA (Hons) Politics and Sociology. Students who leave the course early may be eligible for a BA Politics and Sociology on successful completion of 300 credits at Level 4 or above (including at least 180 credits at Level 5 or above and at least 60 credits at Level 6), a DipHE Politics and Sociology on successful completion of 240 credits including all mandatory modules at levels 4 and 5, or a CertHE Politics and Sociology on successful completion of 120 credits including all mandatory modules at level 4.

Course Delivery

The course is delivered at University of Suffolk. Students studying full-time on BA (Hons) Politics and Sociology are likely to have approximately 12 hours per week (288 hours per year) tutor-structured learning for level 4, 9 hours per week (216 hours per year) tutor-structured learning for level 5, and 8 hours per week (192 hours per year) tutor-structured learning for level 6. Tutor-structured learning will be a mix of lectures, seminars, workshops, tutorials, and guided learning activities which take place on campus and through our online learning environment. There is an optional work placement and work shadowing opportunity equivalent to 10 days in the final year of study. Students will normally be expected to undertake 28 hours of independent study in an average week at level 4, (672 hours per year), 31 hours of independent study at level 5, (744 hours per year) and 32 hours of independent study at level 6, (768 hours per year), but should be prepared for this to vary based on assignment deadlines and class exercises.

Course Assessment

A variety of assessments will be used on the course to enable students to experience and adapt to different assessment styles. The assessment methods used will be appropriate to assess each module's intended learning outcomes. Assessment on the course overall will be mostly coursework (including essays, reports, presentations, group work, reflective learning journals and research projects) with two examinations.

Course Team

The academic staff delivering this course are drawn from specialist politics, sociology and social science teaching teams. All staff are qualified in their subjects with their own specialist knowledge to contribute.

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Course Costs

Students undertaking BA (Hons) Politics and Sociology will be charged tuition fees as detailed below.
